YEAR 1

We learn about, discuss and debate:

YEAR 2

- Freedom, human nature and the role of the state. What will we surrender our freedoms for? What does our government owe us and what do we owe each other?
- Influence; how we are influenced, why some have more influence and why money talks.
- Civil rights; who deserves rights and what happens to groups that don't have power?
- Extremes of ideology; are your national traits and values superior to others'?
 Should countries forge their own place in the world, or surrender power to supranational organisations?
- How populists harness discontent to create radical insider and outsider movements.
